
Carham Parish Council Newsletter


Vacancy for a Parish Councillor

Carham Parish Council is in a position to co-opt a new councillor. A councillor's task is to bring local issues to the attention of the council, and help it make decisions on behalf of the local community. There are usually six Parish Council meetings a year, and training is available to help councillors to develop skills and knowledge. This is a voluntary position. Carham Parish Footpaths Group

The aim of the Footpaths Group is to check that the public rights of way in the parish are open and in good condition. The walks it organises are a good way of doing this, and over the five years since it was set up the group has arranged 15 walks around the parish's 12 miles of footpaths, bridle paths and byways. Even if there are no walks in the offing, the public rights of way are not forgotten. Earlier this year, the walks organiser compiled a comprehensive audit of missing and broken byway, bridle path and footpath signage in the parish. This information has been sent to Northumberland County Council, which is the body responsible for the footpaths and other public rights of way. A recent update to the audit has also been sent.

Public Access Defibrillators

We are delighted that the project to get public access defibrillators into the parish's communities has been so well supported by residents. At some point next year, we expect this project to become an entity in its own right. It will still be supported by the Parish Council, of course, but being separate will enable it to get its own bank account and start applying for grants. This is essential, if it is to succeed. A defibrillator costs around £2,000, and if every community is to have one, we will need to raise just short of £40,000 over the next four or five years. But match-funding and grants should cover much of the cost, together with more local fundraising. The support the project has enjoyed so far gives us confidence that the project will meet its objectives. 2024-25 Precept

The Parish Council cannot, unfortunately, do very much to help residents with the cost of living, but we have made sure that the annual precept has not increased, as this is something that we do have the power to do. The precept is the money that we need to run the Parish Council, covering non-discretionary items such as insurance, accountancy fees and the Parish Clerk's salary. It also covers ad hoc items, such as the purchase of a speed sign for Carham and the repair of the speed sign in Wark. The money for the precept comes from the Council Tax, of which it is a very small part – less than 1%.

Happy to Help

Carham Parish Council is an elected body in the first tier of local government. It is responsible for representing the interests of the whole community. Among other things, it is concerned with community safety, street lighting, common land, play areas, litter, tourism, traffic calming, seats and shelters, rights of way, and some aspects of planning and highways.

The Parish Council meets six times a year. Meetings are in alternate months beginning in May, on the second Tuesday of the month, in St Cuthbert's Church, Carham at 6.3opm. Anyone living or working in the parish can attend a meeting.
