This update is to let you know how we're getting on with the project to get public access AEDs (automatic external defibrillators) into the communities of Carham parish. If you don't know about this project, or aren't sure why we need defibrillators, there's information overleaf.

Since we launched the project at Easter, the response to our fundraising efforts has been fantastic. Parish residents have donated prizes, produce and plants for us to sell or raffle, and have turned out to support the Travelling Tombola and our July event. Many of you have donated money, too, and we've received a very generous donation of £500 from a local business – see over. All in all, the defibrillator fund now stands at £3,041.76.

MONEY RAISED SO FAR

At time of writing the defibrillator fund stands at a fantastic £3,041.76. About a third of this was raised at the Classic Car & Bike Show and Car Boot Sale that we held on 16 July. The rest was raised by the Travelling Tombola, individual donations, two Wark village events, and a very generous donation from local business Deer Dynamics Ltd – see below.

We plan to make this money go much further by using it as match funding when applying for grants. That way, we'll be able to double, triple or even quadruple the amount of money we have to buy defibrillators for the parish.

THE NEXT STEP

This project began with Carham Parish Council, but it's too large an undertaking for a small parish council with limited resources.

So, the next step is for the project to become an entity in its own right. This may take some time, but it's worth doing as it will enable us to open our own bank account and start applying for grants.

CALLING ALL GARDENERS!

Carham parish resident Georgie Nisbet is selling fleece from her sheep to raise funds for the defibrillator project. Natural, unwashed fleece has many uses in the garden, from deterring slugs and snails to providing frost protection. Used as a mulch or in a compost heap, it breaks down naturally and adds nutrients to the soil. At £3 a fleece, or £5 for two, it's a cheap - and local alternative to commercial soil improvers and mulches. Contact Georgie on 07972 247 410.

ABOUT THIS PROJECT

If you're with someone whose heart stops and you call 999, the emergency services will tell you where the nearest public access defibrillator is located, and will give you the code to access it. But they won't give you this information if the defibrillator's too far away from where you are. How far is too far? The chances of survival for someone in cardiac arrest drop by 10% with each minute that passes, so even if the nearest defibrillator's five minutes away, it's too far to be of any help.

Two-thirds of Carham parish's residents live in farm settlements, most of which are a mile or more from each other. We want to get public access defibrillators installed in all of the parish's communities (see overleaf), so that everyone has a life-saving AED (automatic external defibrillator) within reach.

ABOUT AEDs

Public access defibrillators (AEDs) save lives. The British Heart Foundation says the survival rate for out-of-hospital cardiac arrests is less than one in 10, but cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) can more than double the chances of survival in some cases, and electrical defibrillation (providing a shock to the heart to enable it to resume its rhythm), used with CPR, has a good success rate.
