DEFIBRILLATORS FOR CARHAM PARISH



NO. 6 | JULY 2025 | PROJECT UPDATE

It's taken longer than we expected to buy and install the first public access defibrillators in the parish, as it's proved difficult to find a power supply for each of them. We've also struggled to find an electrician who can give us advice and help us with the installations without charging us a commercial rate. We need power for the defibs as they'll be housed in heated cabinets that will keep them from freezing in cold weather. We're beginning to solve some of the problems, though, and on the strength of that we've bought the first two defibrillators. These will be installed in two of the four communities that applied last year.

Thanks to the support of Carham parish residents, our fundraising has continued to go well, and at our AGM in May we were able to announce that there was £14,723 in the bank account. This means that we have enough money to buy another two defibrillators and cabinets, over and above the four for which we've received applications. If your community would like to apply for one of these two defibs, there's information overleaf about how to do this.

AGNES CHANGLENG

We're very sorry to let you know that our Treasurer, Agnes Changleng, died at the end of June, after a battle with cancer. Agnes was a staunch supporter of the defibs project, donating prizes, selling raffle tickets, and helping out at all our events. As Treasurer she brought expertise and professionalism to the project, as well as sound judgement. She continued to take an interest in the project's progress until her very last days.

ABOUT THIS PROJECT

If you're with someone whose heart stops and you call 999, the emergency services will tell you where the nearest public access defibrillator is located, and will give you the code to access it. But they won't give you this information if the defibrillator's too far away from where you are. How far is too far? The chances of survival for someone in cardiac arrest drop by 10% with each minute that passes, so even if the nearest defibrillator's five minutes away, it's too far to be of any help.

Two-thirds of Carham parish's residents live in farm settlements, most of which are a mile or more from each other. We want to get public access defibrillators installed in all of the parish's communities (see overleaf), so that everyone has a life-saving AED (automatic external defibrillator) within reach.

ABOUT AEDs

Public access defibrillators (AEDs) save lives. The British Heart Foundation says the survival rate for out-of-hospital cardiac arrests is less than one in 10, but cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) can more than double the chances of survival in some cases, and electrical defibrillation (providing a shock to the heart to enable it to resume its rhythm), used with CPR, has a good success rate.
