
Carham Parish Council Newsletter

Bus Service for Carham Parish


County Councillor Mark Mather has been working with Northumberland County Council and Scottish Borders Council on changes to the bus services in the north rural areas. For Carham parish, this will mean a bus service along the B6350, calling at **Carham** and **Wark** and connecting with nearby communities, including Cornhill on Tweed, Wooler, Kelso and Duns. The proposed timetable takes into account residents' comments as far as possible, but not every request can be met as the bus has limited availability around school times, when it is needed for the school service. There are still some points to be ironed out, but it is expected that the new service will begin in early 2026. Bus passes will be valid on both sides of the border.

Precept for 2026-27

In January, Carham Parish Council will have to decide whether to increase the annual precept. This is the money – a very small part of the Council Tax – that we are given by Northumberland County Council as our budget. The greater part of our expenditure is on non-discretionary items such as insurance, bank charges, the Parish Clerk's salary, and play park inspections. The remainder covers ad hoc items such as repairs to Parish Council assets, the purchase of items that we think are needed in the parish, and support for community activities. We keep a certain amount of money in reserve, for any unanticipated expenditure. The precept was last increased in 2016 and since then many of our costs have increased. We also have new costs on the horizon, as we will be required to have a dot-gov website from early next year which we will have to pay for. So it is likely that we will have to ask Northumberland County Council for an increase.

Winter Grit

There are a number of grit bins in the northern half of the parish, with grit provided by Northumberland County Council for use when the steep roads are icy and vehicles need grit for traction. If you notice that your local grit bin is empty, please report it using Fix My Street. Go to fix.northumberland.gov.uk or click on the "Report a problem to the County Council" link on the home page of our website, www.carhamparish.org.

You can use Fix My Street to report a wide range of problems with roads and other public rights of way, including fly-tipping, potholes, street lighting, abandoned vehicles, overgrown footpaths, worn road markings and damaged road signs.

Ford Bridge Closure

Ford Bridge is due to be closed from 12 January 2026 to 2 May 2026 to enable Northumberland County Council to carry out inspections and refurbishment works. Any updates will be published on the One Network website, which gives details of known road closures, road works and diversions. Carham Parish Defibs

Three public access defibrillators have been installed, in **Carham, Wark** and **West Moneylaws**, and another one is in the pipeline for **Mindrum Station**. The defibrillators have been registered with The Circuit, which means they are available to the ambulance services on both sides of the border.

We want Carham Parish Council to be as representative as possible of the whole of the parish. Carham Parish Council is an elected body in the first tier of local government. It is responsible for representing the interests of the whole community. Among other things, it is concerned with community safety, street lighting, common land, play areas, litter, tourism, traffic calming, seats and shelters, rights of way, and some aspects of planning and highways.

The Parish Council meets six times a year. Meetings are in alternate months beginning in May, on the second Monday of the month, in St Cuthbert's Church, Carham, at 6.30 pm. Anyone living or working in the parish can attend a meeting.
